(To Nineveh)

Old Testament Survey : J O N A H

Author: Jonah - His name means "Dove"

Jonah son of Amittai (1:1). He was from Gath Hepher (2 Kings 14:25). Gath Hepher was three miles north of Nazareth in lower Galilee. Jesus confirms the story of Jonah in Matthew 12:39-41 (see also Luke 11:29-31 & Matt. 16:4)

Date: 780-753 (2 Kings 14:25 indicates Jonah prophesied during Jeroboam II's reign)

**Biblical Context**: 2 Kings 13:10-25, 14:23-29. Contemporaries: Amos, Hosea. (Reign of Jeroboam II)

Theme: God's fathomless mercy extends to all those who repent and turn.

Setting: Israel under Jeroboam II was enjoying a period of prosperity after the many bleak years they had endured. Nationalistic fever may have been high. Assyria was in a period of mild decline due to weak rulers, but they were still a threat. Assyrian cruelty had already become legendary. Their own records from the 9th - 7th centuries B.C. give graphic account of their cruel treatment of captives. The repentance of Ninevah (capital city of Assyria) probably occurred in the reign of Ashurdan III (773-775 B.C.). Historians mark two plagues (765 & 759) and a solar eclipse (763) and events that may have prepared the people for Jonah's message.

## Key verses

Jonah 2:8 (NASB) "Those who regard vain idols Forsake their faithfulness, 9 But I will sacrifice to Thee With the voice of thanksgiving. That which I have vowed I will pay. Salvation is from the Lord."

Jonah 4:2 (NASB) And he prayed to the Lord and said, "Please Lord, was not this what I said while I was still in my [own] country? Therefore, in order to forestall this I fled to Tarshish, for I knew that Thou art a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness, and one who relents concerning calamity.

Possibilities for the fish appointed to swallowed Jonah: Whale Sharks: *canis carcharias* (a sea dog), *squalus carcharias* (a sea dog), *= carchorodon carchairias*, or a *cachalot* (Sperm Whale). All are common to the area and capable of swallowing a human whole.
